



Animals on the Farm!



Cattle


Some cattle are raised for meat, and others are raised for milk.

Female (girl) cattle are called **cows**, and male (boy) cattle are called **bulls**.



A dairy cow can drink 35 gallons of water, and eat 20 lbs. of grain and 35 lbs. of hay a day. That same day, the milk she produces can make 112 glasses of milk, or 10 sticks of butter, or 6 lbs. of cheese.




Pigs

Newborn pigs are called **piglets**.

An adult female is called a **sow**, and an adult male is a **boar**. A sow may have between 6 and 18 piglets in her litter. Swine is another word used to talk about hogs.



Pig skin is used as leather to make shoes and footballs. Doctors use pig skins for people who have been burned. Pigs are also used to make some medicines. Farmers feed pigs corn, barley, wheat, rye, sorghum, oats, and soybeans.


Sheep

Male sheep are called **rams**. Female sheep are called **ewes**, and young sheep are **lambs**.



Sheep provide wool for clothes, blankets, carpets, and felt. A special kind of oil called lanolin is produced by the sheep's skin and it's used in hand lotion and soap.



Chickens

Female chickens are called **hens**, and male chickens are called **roosters**. Newborn chickens are called **chicks**.



Roosters have big combs on top of their heads and waddles under their beaks. Chickens like to eat bugs, worms, and grains like millet, corn, and milo.
